Trip Opportunities

Each year, Iowa County 4-H sponsors a variety of fun and exciting trips for youth in 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th grades. The same application will be completed for all trips. **Trip application forms are available in the Extension Office and on our website (**http://iowa.uwex.edu/) **and are due on October 1, 2019** No late applications will be accepted. Complete instructions for these applications are included with the forms. Trip interviews will be conducted on **Sunday, October 13, 2019, beginning at 1:00 pm.** The 4-H Leaders Association provides financial support for these trips.

Graduating member scholarship (application)-If you are a graduating 4-H member, you may apply for the scholarship. This will be due on October 1st. Applications will be emailed to eligible members.



National 4-H Congress (Application and interview required) -Approximately \$1200 -- National 4-H Congress will be held
November 27- December 1 in Atlanta, Georgia. Delegates
participate in self-development seminars, tours and a service
project, while exchanging ideas with youth from across the country.
Participants must be in 10th-12th grade at time of selection with a
maximum age of 18 as of January 1, 2020.

4-H Key Award (Application and interview required) -- This state level award is sponsored by Wisconsin Farm Bureau and its affiliates, and provides special recognition to 4-H members who have demonstrated consistent growth in their club program, who have developed their leadership abilities; and who have been helpful in their club and community.





Citizenship Washington Focus (Application and interview required) --Approximately \$1400 – (June 13-21 or July 4-July 12) 90 Wisconsin Youth attend this leadership program held at the National 4-H Center in Washington D.C. Participants learn the importance of civic and social responsibilities as they relate to the development of better citizens and leaders. The week consists of workshops, speakers, committee work, field trips, and social events. Participants must be in 10th - 12th grades as of October 1, 2019.

Trip Opportunities



Space Camp (application and interview required) –10-15 youth—approximately \$625—Selected 6th-8th grade youth travel from April 16-20 to Huntsville, Alabama at the US Space and Rocket Center as part of the 4-H Missions in Space program. This is a fun-filled weekend where participants will complete a simulated Space Shuttle mission, experience training simulators, tour the U.S. Space & Rocket Center and learn about astronauts. Delegates must be in 6th - 8th grade at the time of the program.

State 4-H and Youth Conference (application and interview required)—10-15 youth-- Approximately \$300--Selected youth spend 4 days on the UW-Madison campus (June 22-25) where they choose to participate in a variety of seminars, tours, general assemblies, and recreational activities. Youth must be in 7th, 8th, 9th, or 10th grades as of October 1, 2020.





National 4-H Conference (Application and interview required) –Approximately \$1300--This conference is future focused with emphasis on youth giving input on future direction that 4-H takes at the national level. Only 8 - 10 Wisconsin youth are selected each year to attend this working conference held at the National 4-H Youth Conference Center in Chevy Chase, Maryland. Participants must be in 10th-12th grade at time of selection.

A Note to 4-H Parents from Sarah Weier, Iowa County 4-H Coordinator

This past county fair season I noticed several instances of adult conduct that was wonderful – you may have encouraged a youth, you may have listened, you assisted youth in getting projects ready, you thanked the volunteers at the fair. Here are a few tips for parents and adults to have a positive 4-H experience at the fair and all year.

Follow the rules and encourage your child to do so. Teach youth the importance of following rules. When parents remove items from the fair house or barns before allowed, it sends the message that rules don't need to be followed. Please remember not only your children but other youth are watching.

Follow the instructions from the volunteer superintendents. The key here is volunteer. We are very fortunate to have people give their time so generously at the county fair. Many times the volunteers are following the rules set by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Tie your cattle in the assigned space, respect superintendents' decisions including not addressing a judge, understand food items for safety reasons cannot be taken home, and much more.

Focus on what your child does well. Your child may never excel in dairy showmanship, but they can calm a bunny with a gentle touch. Your child may not be able to grow a perfect pumpkin, but they can make the best pumpkin pie. Your child may not be able to control watercolors, but they can take a gorgeous photograph from the perfect angle. All too often our society has focused on the lowest ribbon or grade received, not the highest. Encourage young people to develop skills that come naturally to them.

Forgive other adults, parents and youth. Most of us are exhausted by the end of the lowa County Fair, including the youth. Sometimes we all take a misstep. Missteps are not a failure but a way for us to gain an understanding of our strengths and limits.

Formula for understanding and learning about 4-H is to keep informed. Read the newsletter, attend club meetings, volunteer at the fair, write down important dates, ask questions.

Finish the 4-H year by helping your child see progress and knowledge gained. Ask them what they learned. Ask them what they would like to explore next year in 4-H. Ask, ask, ask and listen, listen, listen.



Cloverbud Corner

The nighttime sky is one of the most beautiful things when camping. It is difficult to appreciate when living in the city, but once you are away from the city lights, it can be stunning. The stars are not only pretty, but they have also been very important for explorers and travelers for thousands of years. Christopher Columbus and the Pilgrims used the nighttime stars to help guide them across the Atlantic Ocean to the New World. Even today with modern gadgets, like global positioning systems (GPS), stars still play a central role in navigation. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) even uses them to guide unmanned space explorers to far away planets like Jupiter and Saturn and the former planet Pluto!


Being able to locate the North Star (also called Polaris by astronomers) is quite useful when trying to find your way. It can help guide those who are lost in the woods to safety. The North Star is cleverly named that because it is always due North. Once campers find it, it is easy to determine the other directions. West is to their left, east to their right, and south is behind them.

Look at the night sky. You'll notice the stars make some patterns and shapes - called constellations. Can you find any?

Do you see a group of seven stars that look like a long ladle or a pan with a curved handle? Look carefully, it may be upside down! Three stars form the handle and four stars form the pan. That group of stars is called the **Big Dipper**. If you draw a line between the two stars that form the pan on the opposite side of the handle, the line would point to the North Star.

The North Star is located in another smaller ladle. Since this constellation is smaller than the Big Dipper, it is called the **Little Dipper**. The North Star is the brightest star in the Little Dipper, so the rest of the stars may be more difficult to see than those in the Big Dipper. Like the Big Dipper, the Little Dipper is made of seven stars – three form the handle and four form the pan. The North Star is the last star in the handle of the Little Dipper.
