As some of you may already know as well, due to recent county budget cuts, we will not have an intern assisting us this year.



4-H Summer Academy








Foods & Clothing Review

4-H Club AFR Information

As in past years, all 4-H Clubs and Groups that have a checking and/or savings account must complete and submit the following documents to their 4-H Program Educator by Friday August 22, 2025:

- 1. Wisconsin 4-H Clubs & Groups <u>Annual Financial</u> Report
- 2. Wisconsin 4-H Clubs & Groups Audit Checklist
- 3. A copy of the checkbook and/or savings registry covering July 1 June 30
- 4. A copy of the bank statement ending June 30 or July 1 for each account. Any differences between the bank statement(s) and the ending balance reported must be reconciled and the reconciliation must be uploaded with the Annual Financial Report.
- 5.A current inventory of land, buildings, property, or project equipment with individual values of \$2,000 or greater.
- 6. Monthly Treasurer's Reports for 4-H Clubs or Groups with annual income greater or equal to \$20,000.

4-H Volunteer VRKC Guide

GROWING YOU, GROWING YOUTH





What's your learning objective?

A learning objective is what your audience will learn and be able to do at the end of a lesson or presentation. They should be specific and something that you can measure. As volunteers, you put in a lot of time working with youth to plan a wide variety of opportunities, and incorporating learning objectives will increase the quality of programming.

Learning objectives get to the purpose, or the 'why' of what you are doing. For example, if your youth leaders are planning to teach a cooking class, spend time thinking about the "why." Perhaps they are offering the class to low-income youth who have limited access to fresh fruits and vegetables. What is the bigger picture you want them to gain? Your learning objectives may look like:

- Youth will be able to make healthier choices because they will know how to cook with vegetables.
- 2. <u>Youth will be able to</u> safely cook meat using a meat thermometer.

These learning objectives are simple, yet powerful and impactful. Many times, we are so busy offering the

programming, that we don't think about what the deeper goals are. You can either design a program, project or club meeting around a learning objective or identify learning objectives after you have thought out a program. They should always start with "Youth will be able to..." One good way to make sure you have great objectives is to use some of the 4-H Foundations, such as the Targeting Life Skills Wheel: https://4h.extension.wisc.edu/files/2020/08/Life-Skills-Wheel.pdf

At the end of the event, make sure to evaluate whether or not the objective is met by using a survey or observing. Finally, when you have the chance to share about your 4-H volunteer work with others, now you will have a clearly defined explanation of the impact and/or skills learned.

SCIENCE OF SEASONS:

THE INVISIBLE SHIELD

HOW DOES SUNSCREEN WORK?

Have you ever been in the sun too long and received a sunburn? Ouch! Those can really hurt. A sunburn is caused by too much time in ultraviolet light or UV light. UV light comes from is the sun. UV light damages skin cells, which makes the immune system in your body react by increasing blood flow to the that area, which causes the sunburn.

When you put sunscreen on your skin it creates an

When you put sunscreen on your skin it creates an invisible shield that protects your skin from being burned. This thin layer is what prevents you from getting burned by the UV light.

You will need: -Roll-on sunscreen - Colored paper

LET'S EXPERIMENT

Go outside and take 2 or 3 different colors of paper and roll-on sunscreen with you. On the colored paper draw an image, shape, or anything you want on it with the roll-on sunscreen. Then place a rock or something heavier to hold down the paper. Come back in a few hours to check on your paper. Where on the paper has the color changed and why do you think it has changed?

Life Lesson: Sunburns can damage your skin and hurt really bad. It is important to plan for when you go outside. Make a list of items you will need if you decide to spend the day outside. Work with a trusted adult to create a kit that you can easily grab to take with you that has all of your items in it.
