

# **About 4-H: The Basics**

#### What is 4-H?

4-H is a youth organization that belongs to the members, their families, and other interested adults who serve as volunteer leaders. It is a community of young people across America learning leadership, citizenship, and life skills.

Support for 4-H programs is a joint effort of local county government, the Division of Extension of University of Wisconsin-Madison, and the United States Department of Agriculture.

#### What Makes 4-H Different?

4-H is unique because it is the only youth organization tied to the research base of our nation's land grant universities. In Wisconsin, this is the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dan Brandt, Iowa County 4-H Coordinator, is hired by the University of Madison Division of Extension to work with youth and families in our communities.

#### **4-H Enrollment**

Enrollment is done online at https://v2.4honline.com, or assistance can be provided by the UW-Extension office for those without internet access. When enrolling, members will be asked for the following information:

- · Basic contact information
- · General demographic info such as age, gender, grade in school, school attending, etc
- · A health history including allergies and special needs. This is required for many educational events such as camps, trips, and county programs
- · Agreement to the 4-H Code of Conduct
- · Choice of club, project areas, and other activities/interests

Members must enroll in at least one project area per year. Enrolling in a project lets club leaders and 4-H staff know what types of projects members in our county are interested in exploring. This allows staff to distribute pertinent information to members interested in specific projects via e-mail or letters.

If you forget your family password, you can reset it. If you are having trouble logging in, contact the Extension office at 608-930-9850. DO NOT create a new account!



# **About 4-H: The Basics (cont.)**

#### What is the 4-H Year?

The 4-H year is from September 1<sup>st</sup> through August 31<sup>st</sup>. Re-enrollment takes place in the fall months for continuing members with a deadline of December 1<sup>st</sup> in order to be eligible to show at the Iowa County Fair, receive awards, or go on trips. New members can join anytime; however, if you want to exhibit at the Iowa County Fair, you must enroll by April 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### Who can join 4-H?

Any youth in Kindergarten (age 5) through the year following high school can be a member of a 4-H club.

#### **Membership Dues**

All members pay \$10.00 per year for membership. There is a maximum of \$30.00 per family for membership. This covers insurance and project support.

#### 4-H Code of Conduct

Youth participating in or attending local, regional, state, or national 4-H programs are required to conduct themselves according to the Wisconsin 4-H Code of Conduct, which they sign when they enroll in 4-H. All adults are expected to behave in ways that promote positive role modeling for all youth.

#### 4-H Theme

Every year, the state 4-H office decides on a new 4-H Theme. This theme is used in all promotions for the year, including any floats in local parades.

#### How do I Re-enroll in 4-H?

You will re-enroll online. Be sure you complete all the information and provide correct addresses and e-mails so your leaders and the Extension office can communicate with your family. You will sign up for new projects and re-enroll in current projects. You can also indicate if you need project literature. A packet of instructions will be provided to each family and your club leader and the 4-H staff in the Extension Office can also assist you with questions about enrollment. Be sure to re-enroll in 4-H by December 1<sup>st</sup> to be eligible for all 4-H activities and events. You can enroll in 4-H at any time, but you have to be a member by certain dates to exhibit at the county fair, to go to camp, to be a club officer, etc.





# The Thriving Experience

4-H is about creating experiences that help youth, and adults, learn in new ways and gain new experiences. Parents are encouraged to attend 4-H meetings with their child(ren). Below, you will find the general learning experiences that you will face while involved in the 4-H program:

<u>4-H Club Meetings</u> are held for a variety of reasons. Most organized clubs meet monthly to discuss general business, conduct recreation, and learn something new. Clubs have elected officers, by-laws, and a treasury. 4-H Clubs are non-profit organizations.

<u>4-H Projects</u> should fit individual member's interests and should fit into the member's home and community life. By "project" we mean work done with animals, articles made, crops grown, robot programming, or some other definite undertaking planned and carried out by the 4-H'er. Through project work, 4-H members can learn improved ways of doing things, which in turn serve as examples for others and for the community. Members can also learn about subjects that interest them as possible career choices. Members select projects when enrolling through 4-H Online.

<u>4-H Activities</u> such as judging, demonstrations, public speaking, exhibiting, and nursing home visits that center on 4-H projects and community service. They supplement the project and add greater depth to it. Various activities related to project areas are planned and conducted on county, district, state, and national levels.

**4-H Events** are most often thought of as once-a-year happenings, such as an annual recognition program for youth and adults, a music/drama festival, a family 4-H picnic, the fair, or summer camp. During these types of events, 4-H members might present aspects of their 4-H projects, teach younger youth, and lead activities. 4-H Record Books are a place for you to record what you learned and did with your 4-H projects. All 4-H members are encouraged to report on their 4-H year in the 4-H record book. The project record is a way for you to learn the important life skill of record keeping. A project record has two main parts: the first is the information page, where general 4-H information is recorded, such as offices held, number of meetings attended, committee assignments, etc. The second major section is the project report, which is completed for each project. In this section, you will report what you wanted to learn, what was actually done, and what skills were learned. Completion of a record book is required for trips, awards, and scholarships. 4-H club leaders collect record books in early December. Record books are evaluated by club leaders and/or parents at the club level. Members may be selected to receive a project award based on their work in their project(s). To receive an award, 4-H members must complete a record book, give a speech or demonstration at a club meeting, and exhibit a project at the Fair. Some members are also selected to receive county awards in some project areas. Books selected for special awards are brought to the Extension Office by December of each year.







### 4-H Club Meetings

Almost every 4-H club holds regular club meetings. Even within the same club, no two club meetings are the same. Ideally, every meeting should have three parts—recreation (fun), business, and learning. Youth leadership plays a huge role in the success of a club.

Most clubs have youth officers (president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and other selected roles) who are responsible for running each meeting. Youth leaders not only gain excellent life skills, they help to keep the meeting relevant and fun for members of all ages. All youth have a responsibility to contribute to their clubs through their voice and their actions!

### What is my role as an adult?

Adults help create a safe, positive atmosphere for all 4-H members when they empower and encourage youth. While at a meeting, it's important to be a positive role model for everyone in attendance. Caring adults play an important role in the mental health of youth, and 4-H can help connect youth with positive adults.

### Should I stay or should I go?

It's strongly recommended that parents/guardians attend the 4-H meeting with your child. Club meetings provide great opportunities to learn with other club members, but the learning doesn't stop there. By attending the meeting, you can reflect on the meeting together and continue the education outside the club.



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### Beyond the Club

You're a part of something big! 4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization, with more than 6 million members and over 90,000 clubs. Because of how big 4-H is, it can be hard to understand where you (and everyone else) fits into the greater scope of 4-H from a state and national level.



#### Where do I fit?

Most members get their start with a 4-H club. If your child wants to get more involved with 4-H beyond the club level, check with your club leader or your county-based 4-H staff to learn about additional 4-H opportunities. Getting involved with your county's groups or the Leaders Organization can be great ways to connect with new opportunities.

### **YOUth Matter!**

Youth lead and make decisions in 4-H clubs, groups, and experiences. That means that the most important piece of 4-H is YOU. As a 4-H member, you help to make decisions and can make your voice heard.

You can help to lead and make decisions in 4-H. Each statement is a way that you can get involved. Decide if you think the statement shows how you can be involved in 4-H at the club, county, state, or national level. Circle where this might apply. 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# **Educational Opportunities**

#### 4-H Camp

In June, Iowa County 4-H usually teams up with other counties for 4-H Camp. Youth have many learning opportunities, and this is a great chance to meet other local youth the same age. Older 4-H youth have the opportunity to be a camp counselor.

#### **Educational Traveling**

The State 4-H program offers various travel opportunities to youth. Iowa County requires an application to be filled out along with an interview. Travel opportunities include: 4-H and Youth Conference in Madi son, Citizenship Washington Focus in Washington DC, Space Camp in Alabama, American and West ern Spirit, National 4-H Congress in Georgia, International trips (past sites were Costa Rica, Finland, and Japan) and hosting international 4-H'ers during the summer. Information and registering for these events is mainly completed through 4H Online.

#### **State Art Events**

Older youth in grades 9-13 and adults are welcome to apply for statewide 4-H art experiences in visu al arts, communications, theatre, and music. State Art Camp, held in the fall, is open to middle school ers, and Art Beat in March is for 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> graders.

#### **Exploration Day**

Held every March, Exploration Days is a great opportunity to get a jump start on your fair projects. 4-H clubs, leaders, and youth volunteers lead sessions on different project topics.

#### **Quiz Bowl**

Practices are held in the winter and spring. Competition is held in late winter for livestock and dairy quiz bowl. Dog quiz bowl practices are held in late spring/summer with competition happening during the summer. Horse Bowl practices are held on Thursday evenings September through April, with the state Competition in May.

#### **Area Animal Science Day**

A district event where the 4-H Dairy, Livestock, and Horse Judging Teams compete. AASD includes competition, education, and an opportunity to meet youth from throughout Southern Wisconsin. Winning individuals and teams may compete at state contests.

#### **4-H Junior Leaders**

Are youth in 7th grade and older who promote 4-H in the county and help at special 4-H events through out the year. Youth who are interested in being a Junior Leader complete an application to join.

#### The Iowa County Fair

Is the highlight of the year for many 4-Hers. This event provides an opportunity for youth to exhibit or display the projects they have worked on all year. Each project is judged and suggestions are given to the exhibitors. The Iowa County Fair is held on Labor Day Weekend at the Fairgrounds in Mineral Point. The 4-H Dog Show is held before the fair.

#### Cloverbud Day

A day program held at the Iowa County Fairgrounds for members in Kindergarten to 2<sup>nd</sup> grade to explore 4H projects, learn the 4H Pledge, and make new friends.

#### **Achievement Day**

Held each year, provides an opportunity for 4-Hers to be recognized for their project work. A large number of awards are given based on club activities and attendance, the 4-H record book, and leader recommendations. 4-H record books are a place for 4-H members to record what they learn and do with their 4-H projects. These are due in September to the general leader.

# **The Iowa County Fair**

The Iowa County Fair is just around the corner, and for many 4-H members, this event is the highlight of the 4-H year. Youth have an opportunity to show what they have learned and done during the year. Our fair is traditionally held on Labor Day weekend each year. The fair begins on Thursday with judging of youth entries and continues through Labor Day Monday. There is a lot to do and see at the fair!

Remember that exhibiting projects at the fair should be a learning experience. One learns not only from projects well done, but also from mistakes that are made. Youth learn responsibility, time management, communication skills, creativity, and many other life skills at the same time they complete their 4-H projects.

#### TAKING ENTRIES TO THE IOWA COUNTY FAIR

Be sure to read the Fair Book for details about project entries. For example, groups of photographs should be displayed on a poster that is 11" by 14" and posters in other project areas should be 14" by 22". Also check to see if you need to include a card telling about your project or describing the materials you used, etc. Drawing and painting entries need to be mounted or framed and have a hanger. These are just a few of the things you need to make note of. Read the fair book for each department you enter for more information, or call the Fair Office if you still have questions. Online entries are due on August 1st.

You will receive entry tags in the mail in mid-August. Each project you bring to the fair needs to have an entry tag attached. Check the fair book for directions on where to attach the tag. Tear off the bottom portion of the tag and keep it. You will need this tag when you pick up your items after the Fair on Monday.

The recent issues of the Clover Connection have included information about season tickets for the Fair. Youth and adults who exhibit receive a season ticket with their entry fee. Others must pay daily to enter the Fair or purchase a season ticket.

Face-to-Face Judging will take place on the Wednesday before the fair. Different projects are chosen each year to give every youth an opportunity to sit and discuss their project with a judge. Check the newsletter or the Fair Book for project areas that are being judged face-to-face this year. Cloverbuds meet with a judge on Sunday to discuss their projects. Fair entries can be brought to the Youth Building at the Fairgrounds in Mineral Point on Wednesday between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. or Thursday 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. Exhibits must be in place by 10 a.m. on Thursday. Judging of these exhibits will begin at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday. Youth and adults are welcome to watch the judging which will take place most of the day on Thursday. This is a great way to learn more about your project and to see what other youth entered.

Once the projects are judged, they are displayed in the Youth Building for the remainder of the fair. Be sure to stop in during the fair to see all the beautiful projects! Fair entries can be picked up between 3:30 p.m. and 5 p.m. on Monday.

If you are showing animals at the fair, check the fair book for specific information. Animal exhibits might need health papers or registration papers. Each animal species shows at different times in a variety of locations. The animals are on display at the fair until Monday afternoon.

# 4-H Volunteer Opportunities

4-H Volunteers are a big part of what makes 4-H such a great organization. These adults give of their time and talents to help foster youth into adults. Volunteers play an important role from club leaders, project leaders, camp volunteers, and so much more each day in 4-H. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer and helping the youth of today grow into the leaders of tomorrow, please feel free to reach out to the county 4-H Youth Development Educator for more information.

There is one basic training you need to complete to become an authorized 4-H Volunteer. The other element is you need to complete a background check with HireRight. These are mostly online trainings provided by the University and must be completed to be an authorized volunteer within 4-H. Please consider this great opportunity for yourself and the youth of Iowa County.

# 4-H Terminology

If you are new to the 4-H program, it can be a lot to take in. 4-H has a long and rich history - we are over 100 years old! Sometimes this means that volunteers, families, and staff may forget that the terminology we use is not something that everyone understands yet. Hopefully this will help you out a bit on that front, however, NEVER hesitate to ask questions!

- <u>4-H Key Award:</u> The highest honor awarded to a 4-H member in the state of Wisconsin. Iowa County requires an application and interview of older members to be considered for this award.
- <u>4-H Leader's Association:</u> This organization is made up of 4-H youth and volunteer leaders representing each of the clubs. The group meets 5 times per year to discuss program directions, events, and ways to strengthen the county 4-H program.
- <u>4-H Program Coordinator:</u> A county-based professional who works for the Division of Extension, University of Wisconsin-Madison who guides, teaches, and administers the 4-H program.
- 4-H Online: Site where you enroll in 4-H, select projects, and register for many events/trips.
- Activity Leader: A volunteer who is responsible for organizing and conducting special club activities.
- <u>Adult Leaders:</u> All adults who volunteer for Iowa County 4-H have attended a training meeting, had criminal background check, and have completed mandatory reporter training.
- **AASD:** Area Animal Sciences Day is held in June at several sites around Wisconsin. Many animal project members participate in judging and other contests during the day.
- <u>Charter:</u> A 4-H Charter is granted to 4-H clubs when the minimum requirements are met to start a 4-H club. Club leaders are in charge of ensuring that club charters are completed each year (usually due on November 1<sup>st</sup>).
- <u>Cloverbud:</u> These are youth who are in Kindergarten through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. Cloverbuds can only enroll in the Cloverbud project. They can exhibit three projects at the county fair for participation ribbons and take part in county-wide events.
- <u>Danish Judging:</u> Youth projects at our county fair are awarded ribbons using this formula not more than ¼ Blue, not more than ¼ Red, not more than ¾ White, and the remaining Yellow.
- <u>Enrollment:</u> How one becomes a part of the 4-H program is through completing enrollment on 4H Online. Each year following when you first join 4-H, you will have to fill out re-enrollment by December 1<sup>st</sup>.

Sometimes this means that volunteers, families, and staff may forget that the terminology we use is not something that everyone understands yet. Hopefully this will help you out a bit on that front, however, NEVER hesitate to ask questions!

- <u>Fair:</u> An event where project work is exhibited. Information about county fair is distributed from the Iowa County Fair Board in Iowa County, as they plan and execute the event. Junior Fair is for youth enrolled in 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, or any youth organization with adult leadership. Members may only exhibit in areas in which they carry a project. Adults and youth not a member of a recognized organization can enter the Open Fair.
- <u>Fair Auction:</u> Livestock, small animals, dairy, and goat may sell an animal/cheese at the auction. There are educational and testing requirements that vary by species. Information will be in your newsletter, The Clover Connection.
- <u>Fair Premium Book:</u> The book that lists the Iowa County Fair entry classes and rules for entry. This is often just referred to as the 'Fair Book'.
- <u>Fall Forum:</u> Annual state-wide gathering of youth and adults to elect representatives to the state council. In addition, attendees select sessions to learn how to strengthen and enrich their club and county 4-H program.
- General Club Leader: An adult volunteer who is responsible for the organizational part of the club.
- <u>HHS:</u> Health and Human Services Building, 303 W Chapel St, Dodgeville, WI and site of the Iowa County UW-Extension office. Many county 4-H events are held here.
- <u>Iowa County Fairgrounds:</u> Located on Fair St, Mineral Point, WI and the site of many summer 4-H programs.
- Projects: A unit of 4-H work which is the basis of "learning" experiences which involve learning a skill.
- <u>Project Leader:</u> A volunteer who helps 4-H members as they learn, make, or create something. This person can be a parent who agrees to help with a project, a youth leader, or a person from the community who has knowledge in a particular subject matter area.
- <u>PLD:</u> Project Learning Days are held in February and July. Sessions are announced in The Clover Connection, the county newsletter.
- <u>Project Literature:</u> This information is written by University specialists and serves as suggested areas to study in your 4-H projects. You can request literature from the county Extension office.
- Record Book: An individual report of the 4-H records accomplishments in projects and activities during the current year. Members should complete and submit a record book to be eligible for county awards. Record books are submitted to club leaders in September. Record book pages can be found on the Iowa County Website under 4-H/Record Books.
- <u>Volunteer in Preparation:</u> All adults who wish to volunteer for 4-H must attend a session on the roles and responsibilities of volunteers.
- <u>Youth Leader:</u> A 4-H member who in 8<sup>th</sup> grade or older and is enrolled in the Youth Leadership project. They take an active part in helping the younger members in their club. By doing this, they grow, mature, and learn leadership skills.
- <u>YQCA:</u> Youth for the Quality of Care of Animals is a national multi-species program to train youth in the quality care of animals. Iowa county fair exhibitors who care for animals overnight on the fairgrounds must have completed the training. Wisconsin State Fair requires YQCA for many species to be exhibited. Watch your newsletter for training opportunities.

#### **Civic Engagement**

Discover what is important to you and others, set goals, take action, and build a stronger community. Through this project, you can become an active community member, investigate a public issue, learn about the roles of governing officials, and carry out a plan to solve a problem.

#### Cloverbud

Cloverbud project activities involve youth in grades 5K-2 in learning at an age-appropriate level while having fun with hands-on, engaging activities. It's their chance to explore what 4-H has to offer.

#### Cloverbud Youth Leader

Become a Cloverbud Youth Leader and practice youth leadership skills like teamwork, communication, decisionmaking, and caring. The Cloverbud project is for youth in grades 5K-2. It is their chance to learn what 4-H has to offer. Youth leaders can help create a welcoming environment and lead activities.

#### Communications

#### Beef

The 4-H Beef project allows you to learn about breeds, selection, grooming, production, management, showmanship, marketing, and careers through a breeding or market animal.

#### Cats

Cats can be wonderful companions to individuals and families. The 4-H Cat project helps you explore what kind of cat fits your family's lifestyle. Then, you'll learn about nutrition, health needs, and how to be a responsible owner.

#### Cavies

Did you know that a cavy is what we commonly know as a guinea pig? In the 4-H Cavy project, you can learn about selecting and raising your animals.

#### Dairy

The 4-H Dairy project teaches you about breeds, selection, grooming, production, management, showmanship, marketing, and careers through a dairy animal.

#### Dogs

The Dog project will help you explore what kind of dog fits into your family's lifestyle and how to be an excellent trainer and caretaker of your dog. You will learn about dog breeds, dog ownership, and dog care and management, such as feeding, handling, record-keeping, grooming, and fitting.

#### Exotic Animals

In the Exotic Animals project, you will explore what kinds of animals fit your family's lifestyle. Some examples include ostriches, emus, zebras, or zedonks.

#### Goats

#### Llamas/Alpacas

Llamas and alpacas can be excellent additions to a family farm and make great pets. This project helps you find the kind of llama or alpaca that fits your family's lifestyle. It will help you learn to be an excellent trainer and caretaker of your animal.

#### Pocket Pets

The 4-H Pocket Pet project will help you explore what kind of pet fits into your family's lifestyle and how you can be an excellent caretaker. Pocket pets may include cage birds, reptiles, tropical fish, hamsters, gerbils, chinchillas, and more (but don't really put them in your pockets).

#### Poultry

Explore the poultry industry, including turkeys, chickens, ducks, geese, pheasants, guinea hens, pigeons, or quail. Learn about species and breeds, eggs, feather features, health, feeding, handling, washing, managing a flock, ethics, showing, and careers.

#### Rabbits

Whether you see rabbits as soft and cuddly pets or as a business opportunity, the Rabbit project is flexible for your interest. Through hands-on activities, learn about selection, care, breeding, and more.

#### Sheep

The Sheep project introduces you to various fun and challenging activities, including identifying the parts of a sheep, selecting a project lamb, preparing for lambing season, identifying lamb meat products, and feeding and showing sheep.

#### Swine

This project helps you learn about swine breeds, health care, production, management, showmanship, marketing, and careers in the swine industry. Learn principles of animal science and gain life skills, like responsibility, by owning, caring for, and keeping records.

#### **Veterinary Science**

Learn about a veterinarian's role in animal and public health. Project activities will help you learn about veterinary equipment, diseases and health problems, and career opportunities as a veterinarian or volunteer. You do not have to own an animal to be part of this project!


### **Plant and Soil Science**

#### Crops

In this project, you will learn about different crops grown locally, regionally, and nationally to feed our world. The focus is on crop growth, diseases, and pests impacting agriculture production.



#### Horticulture & Gardening

Growing food, flowers, fruit, and herbs is gardening. Horticulture, the science of growing, helps us understand what we produce, how and where to grow it, and more. Youth in this project may choose to grow plants to eat, look at, or both.

#### Indoor Plants

Indoor plants add beauty and design to any space. Learn about indoor plant varieties and propagation suitable for your home environment. Youth may explore flowering and non-flowering plants.

#### Landscaping & Design

Plants can produce food for your family and add beauty to the earth's landscape or your bedroom. Discover landscaping plants and design fundamentals to create a functional and beautiful environment year-round.

#### Plant Crafts

Bouquets, corsages, and centerpieces. Cut flowers, dried flowers, or other plants. Plant crafts such as flower arranging, pressed flowers, evergreen arrangements, and more can add beauty to a room, an event, or someone's day. Youth in this project will explore ways to be creative with plants.

#### Soil Science

Soil is more than just "dirt." Soil is alive with plants and animal life. In this project, grow your understanding of soil types, what plants need, and how seeds grow into plants. Then, explore how to support the soil by keeping it healthy and preventing erosion.

The Conservation project includes weather and climate, water science, recycling, exploring your environment, and more. Get involved to learn about the natural world and how to help protect it!

#### **Entomology (Insects)**

Insects (including bees) are everywhere! Learn about different types of insects, the largest group of animals on earth, and why they are essential in our natural world. This project is your chance to collect, study, and display insects you find and learn about forensic entomology.

#### Geology

Have you ever found a rock or fossil at a park and wanted to know what it was? Discover the types of minerals, rocks, and fossils found in Wisconsin. Dig into the Geology project!

#### Maple Syrup

In the Maple Syrup project, youth will learn about the tools, trees, and techniques, all while learning to care for the environment.

#### Outdoor Recreation

Let's get active outdoors! This project is for anyone who likes outdoor adventures, including backpacking, hiking, bicycling, camping, canoeing, fishing, rock climbing, winter travel, cross-country skiing, and downhill skiing. The sky is the limit, and adventures are waiting for you!

#### Safety

Safety is essential when anyone uses motorized equipment! In this project, learn about water, fire, electricity, winter, tractor, recreational vehicle safety, and more.

#### Shooting Sports

#### Energy & Electricity

The Energy & Electricity project offers opportunities for hands-on exploration of how energy is transferred and transformed. Build simple to complex electric circuits to understand how we harness energy safely and efficiently.



#### GPS & Mapping

Youth discover the world of orienteering using maps and global positioning system (GPS) technology to explore the world around them or plan an adventure.

#### **LEGO®**

Youth use LEGO® bricks to build simple and complex structures with creativity and imagination. Youth can build structures and landscapes using various bricks to practice engineering, design, and construction skills.

#### **Mechanical Sciences**

Youth will learn about manual and fuel-powered machines, tools, safety, and maintenance. They will get hands-on experiences that will help them understand how machines, such as lawn mowers, ATVs, and model airplanes, operate and how to keep them running.

In the Model Building project, youth will explore designing items in a threedimensional space using architecture and engineering principles. Youth can express their creativity by creating small-scale models like planes, cars, trains, and more!

#### Robotics

Through hands-on activities, youth will learn the basics of robotic systems, structures, sensors, control, and programming.

#### Welding

Youth will explore several techniques for joining metal safely and efficiently. Learn how to repair a metal item or create amazing art with this useful skill.

#### Woodworking

Youth enrolled in the Woodworking project will explore basic wood types and woodworking techniques. Topics include accurate measurements, the use of basic hand tools and power tools, and creating joints.

#### STEM

#### **Learning Opportunities**

- Plan and lead a project workshop for younger members.
- Visit a local business that works in a STEM-related field.
   Ask to job shadow someone who works there.
- Explore different techniques for building or creating things in your project area.
- Identify the essential tools needed for your project and assemble your own toolkit.
- Start a small business related to your project area.
- Attend <u>Space Camp</u> or Advanced Space Academy.
- Volunteer to help a local organization using your project skills.

Track Your Progress
4-H members like you do awesome things every year. Keeping track of what you do in 4-H can help you to talk about your accomplishments with others. Many members keep track of what they did with a 4-H record book. Record books can be really helpful when you apply for college, jobs, or scholarships! If you are unsure of what record keeping your county does, ask your 4-H educator or a club advisor. A sample might be posted on your county webpage.

#### What should I record?

There's a lot that you can do in 4-H, so keeping track of everything might seem like a lot of work. If you answer "Yes" to any of these questions, you should include it in your record.

- Did you learn something?
- Did you complete a project?
- Did you accomplish a goal that you set for yourself?
- Did you receive an award or a scholarship?
- Did you travel somewhere with 4-H?
- Did you spend or receive money for your project?
- Did you make a presentation or give a speech?
- Did you participate in a club activity?
- Did you serve in a leadership role?

#### How do I record it?

Once you've got something to record, you have a lot of ways to keep track of it. Use whatever works best for you and the situation! You might use a mix of all of these things!

- Write your record on a piece of paper, and keep all the paper in a folder.
- Write all your records in a notebook.
- Create a 4-H career scrapbook.
- Set aside a box for ribbons, photos, and all your records.
- Take a video of yourself where you talk about what you did.
- Type your records in an online document.



Completing a craft project or helping out with a club community service project are great things to include in your records!



If you store your records online, have an adult help you keep your information safe! It's always good to store an extra copy of your digital records somewhere.



Club officers should record their time spent learning to lead.

#### Records should always answer these questions:

- 1. What did you do?
- 2. When did you do it?
- 3. What did you learn along the way?
- 4. What important details do you want to remember?

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# **Setting Goals**

Every year, many people create New Year's Resolutions. These resolutions are **goals** for the new year. Fall is the beginning of the new 4-H year, which makes it the perfect time to set goals for about what you want to do!

#### S.M.A.R.T. Goals

Goals are more likely to be successful when you give yourself something specific to aim for. Any of your resolutions for the new 4-H year should be S.M.A.R.T.

Specific: Goals should be well defined and clear.

Measurable: This will help you know when you've been successful.

Achievable: Be realistic! Think of things that will challenge you but are still doable.

Relevant: Your goals should be important to you. Set goals that you want to complete!

Timely: Give yourself a specific time frame to complete your goals.

#### What are your goals?
